# "I can't wait to back up my rucksack and head off"

Many of vou will know that Bill Wood was a lona-time member of Globetrotters. He loved travellina - particularly explorina little-known areas - and when he died he left us an annual leaacy £1.000 for five years to help a young person realise a travel dream.

The Committee is very pleased to announce the first winner.

Mike Dodd. aaed 22. is studvina mechanical enaineerina at the University of Warwick. and will use the award to travel in SE Asia - coincidentally an area much loved by Bill Wood.

As part of his dearee Mike has been involved in developina a portable vehicle bridae for use in Cambodia. and his last university aroup project was the production of a metal detector for land mine clearance specifically for use by civilian humanitarian deminers rather than the military.

Apparently the design requirements are very different for example the operators of the equipment would be crouching rather than standing and would be working continually during the entire day, not occasionally at night or under fire. There is a testing facility in Cambodia for the work done in Warwick and Mike will visit those involved in the manufacture of the mine clearance equipment who are also trying to make a full-sized portable bridge. Mike is keen to see how successfully it works and if any improvements to the design can be made.

Mike savs: "I feel immenselv privileged to be the first person awarded this travel grant and will ensure that I make the most of this opportunity. It has given me the chance to go to an area of the world that I have learned a tremendous amount about over the past few years and I can't wait to pack up my rucksack and head off. There are so many places in the region that I would love to explore and the route I have decided to take starts me off in Banakok where I can arrange visas and other essentials before heading up into Northern Thailand. I'll then travel across through Laos exploring the central region of the country before crossing into Vietnam via the Kaew Pass. I intend to travel down through Vietnam before eventually working my way into Cambodia. This is where I plan to really take my time spending many weeks absorbing myself in the

country and visitina the amazina temple complexes includina Anakor. I will then travel back across into Thailand and work my way down into Malaysia and finally leave the reaion through Kuala Lumpur. I'm planning to leave in early September which will give me plenty of time to plan and research the area. With my finals looming next month planning this trip will a very enjoyable change."

Mike needs to be back in Enaland by Christmas ready to start work in January. He says he loves the freedom of independent travel: if he likes somewhere he will stay a while if not he'll move on. He will use auide books for his plannina and proposes to travel around by bus or train. He has already spent some time travellina in Kenya and described his time there near a territory where there was intense inter-tribal fighting as 'an experience' and character building! Eventually Mike plans to work in a
